Feast of St. Peter and St. Paul

The Feast of Saints Peter and Paul is well documented as early as the fourth century, and it is remarkable to know that in keeping this feast, like so many others, we participate in the faith and tradition of our Christian brethren across the centuries. So in keeping this feast day, we celebrate these two saints together with those who lived just a few generations after Christ's resurrection and ascension. Historically, many have emphasized Peter's background as a fisherman in their celebration of these two apostles. For example, coastal peoples and those in fishing cultures often decorate their boats or wharves on this day in honor of St. Peter.

Saint Peter was a fisherman whom Jesus called into the business of fishing for men. Together with Saints James and John, He remained in Jesus' intimate closer circle. Peter is present along with these two apostles at the Transfiguration. We especially remember Peter for his confession, upon which Christ established his church: "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Commending Peter, Jesus gives him and all the Apostles the keys to the kingdom of heaven so that they (and all their successors) should bind and loose sins as if Christ were speaking the words himself (Matt. 17). At Pentecost, Peter delivers his famous sermon in Jerusalem and then continues on to Samaria, Lydda, Joppa, and Caesarea, bringing the Good News to the Gentiles. According to tradition, Peter died a martyr's death in Rome, but rather than being crucified like his Lord, he insisted that he should be crucified upside down so as not to receive the honor of dying a death like Jesus'.

Saint Paul, formerly called Saul, was a Jew who was converted from a life of zealously persecuting Christians to joining their ranks and eventually writing thirteen epistles that would be included in the New Testament canon. He traveled across the Mediterranean preaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ and would end up being imprisoned, stoned, and tortured while pursuing his task for the love of his Lord Jesus. While St. Paul's death isn't recorded in the canon of the New Testament, it is reported that he was also martyred in Rome on the same day as St. Peter but in a different location. Being a Roman citizen, Paul was beheaded rather than crucified.

First Reading Acts 15:1-21

¹But some men came down from Judea and were teaching the brothers, "Unless you are circumcised according to the custom of Moses, you cannot be saved." ²And after Paul and Barnabas had no small dissension and debate with them, Paul and Barnabas and some of the others were appointed to go up to Jerusalem to the apostles and the elders about this question. ³So, being sent on their way by the church, they passed through both Phoenicia and Samaria, describing in detail the conversion of the Gentiles, and brought great joy to all the brothers. ⁴When they came to Jerusalem, they were welcomed by the church and the apostles and the elders, and they declared all that God had done with them. ⁵But some believers who belonged to the party of the Pharisees rose up and said, "It is necessary to circumcise them and to order them to keep the law of Moses."

⁶The apostles and the elders were gathered together to consider this matter. ⁷And after there had been much debate, Peter stood up and said to them, "Brothers, you know that in the early days God made a choice among you, that by my mouth the Gentiles should hear the word of the gospel and believe. ⁸And God, who knows the heart, bore witness to them, by giving them the Holy Spirit just as he did to us, ⁹and he made no distinction between us and them, having cleansed their hearts by faith. ¹⁰Now, therefore, why are you putting God to the test by placing a yoke on the neck of the disciples that neither our fathers nor we have been able to bear? ¹¹But we believe that we will be saved through the grace of the Lord Jesus, just as they will."

¹²And all the assembly fell silent, and they listened to Barnabas and Paul as they related what signs and wonders God had done through them among the Gentiles. ¹³After they finished speaking, James replied, "Brothers, listen to me. ¹⁴Simeon has related how God first visited the Gentiles, to take from them a people for his name. ¹⁵And with this the words of the prophets agree, just as it is written,

16····After this I will return,
and I will rebuild the tent of David that has fallen;
I will rebuild its ruins,
and I will restore it,
17that the remnant of mankind may seek the Lord,
and all the Gentiles who are called by my name,
says the Lord, who makes these things ¹⁸known from of old.'

¹⁹Therefore my judgment is that we should not trouble those of the Gentiles who turn to God, ²⁰but should write to them to abstain from the things polluted by idols, and from sexual immorality, and from what has been strangled, and from blood. ²¹For from ancient generations Moses has had in every city those who proclaim him, for he is read every Sabbath in the synagogues."

Epistle ReadingGalatians 2:1-10

¹Then after fourteen years I went up again to Jerusalem with Barnabas, taking Titus along with me. ²I went up because of a revelation and set before them (though privately before those who seemed influential) the gospel that I proclaim among the Gentiles, in order to make sure I was not running or had not run in vain. ³But even Titus, who was with me, was not forced to be circumcised, though he was a Greek. 4Yet because of false brothers secretly brought in—who slipped in to spy out our freedom that we have in Christ Jesus, so that they might bring us into slavery— 5to them we did not yield in submission even for a moment, so that the truth of the gospel might be preserved for you. ⁶And from those who seemed to be influential (what they were makes no difference to me; God shows no partiality)—those, I say, who seemed influential added nothing to me. ⁷On the contrary, when they saw that I had been entrusted with the gospel to the uncircumcised, just as Peter had been entrusted with the gospel to the circumcised ⁸(for he who worked through Peter for his apostolic ministry to the circumcised worked also through me for mine to the Gentiles), ⁹and when James and Cephas and John, who seemed to be pillars, perceived the grace that was given to me, they gave the right hand of fellowship to Barnabas and me, that we should go to the Gentiles and they to the circumcised. ¹⁰Only, they asked us to remember the poor, the very thing I was eager to do.



THE CONGREGATION AT PRAYER FOR THE WEEK OF THE FEAST OF ST. PETER AND ST. PAUL

"Built On Christ Crucified"
June 29 through July 5, 2025

The confession of Peter is a celebration of the mercy of God the Father. In American churches the call for decisions and personal experience pushes aside the central reality of faith. Faith does not come from human reason, an emotional experience, or powerful preaching. Faith is a gift of God the Father to human beings who are blind because of sin. Our blind stubbornness prevents any man from coming to faith. Peter was the same, as the episode immediately following this Gospel confirms his vision was still not clear. God the Father opens the eyes of sinful men to behold His own dear Son hidden in the weak flesh of man. By the mercy of the Father, not by the wisdom of flesh and blood, we confess that the bleeding, mutilated body of Christ is the key to our salvation. Who has known the mind of the Father that he can explain this great mystery of grace? The Son is the wisdom and knowledge of His Father. How does the Father reveal this Wisdom and Knowledge? Through the office of the Holy Ministry where the proclamation of the Word binds the sins of the unrepentant and looses the sins of the repentant. As God the Father took Israel as His children so He takes you as His children and brings you out from the bondage of blindness. The Father has opened your mouth to confess that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the Living God.

INVOCATION: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. **AMEN.**

THE BOOK OF CONCORD: The Augsburg Confession (AC VI-VII)

Article VIII What is the Church?

¹Strictly speaking, the Church is the congregation of saints and true believers. However, because many hypocrites and evil persons are mingled within them in this life [Matthew 13:24-30], it is lawful to use Sacraments administered by evil men, according to the saying of Christ, "The Scribes and ²the Pharisees sit on Moses' seat (Matthew 23:2). Both the Sacraments and Word are effective because of Christ's institution and command, even if they are administered by evil men.

³Our churches condemn the Donatists, and others like them, who deny that it is lawful to use the ministry of evil men in the Church, and who think that the ministry of evil men is not useful and is ineffective.

Article IX Baptism

¹Concerning Baptism, our churches teach that Baptism is necessary for salvation [Mark 16:16] and that God's grace is offered through Baptism [Titus 3:4-7]. ² They teach that children are to be baptized [Acts 2:38-39]. Being offered to God through Baptism, they are received into God's grace.

³Our churches condemn the Anabaptists, who reject the Baptism of children, and say that children are saved without Baptism.

Article X The Lord's Supper

¹Our churches teach that the body and blood of Christ are truly present and distributed to those who eat the Lord's Supper [1 Corinthians 10:16]. ²They reject those who teach otherwise.

CATECHISM FOR THE WEEK: The Ten Commandments Review of the Commandments and the Close of the Commandments

What does God say about all of these commandments?

He says, "I, the Lord your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." (Exodus 20:5-6)

What does this mean?

God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands.

READINGS

Micah 7:18-20 1 Timothy 1:12-17 Luke 15:11-32

Luke 15 is a very important parable for understanding the forgiveness of sins, faith, and the true identity of the Father in the Gospel of Luke. It is a story about the life of the baptized in the Church. In Luke's version of the Lord's Prayer, Jesus instructs His disciples to pray Father. The Father is the source of all life and every good thing. He freely bestows His gifts upon all whom He calls sons in baptism. The youngest son's mistake is to see his father as someone who owes him an inheritance. Faith does not see sonship as something we have earned or as a way of earning the Father's favor, but as the gift granted to us in baptism where we are made full heirs of eternal salvation. Faith does not try to bargain with God like the son's original thought, but comes to the Father with the simple confession of sinfulness and unworthiness. The Father then dresses us once more in the baptismal robes and brings us to the feast of His own Son's body and blood that we might live as His own sons once more. The older son does not live by faith either for he also thinks the father owes him something for his loyalty. This is a danger for us in the Church as sometimes we think we deserve more than some who have fallen and then been restored through the forgiveness of sins. Faith lives upon the forgiveness of sins even as we are taught to pray in the Lord's Prayer, Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us.
