Closed Communion

The Sacrament of Holy Communion is celebrated today. As a congregation of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, we follow the historic Christian practice of closed communion. According to the words of St. Paul in 1 Corinthians 11, only those who share the same outward confession of faith join us at the altar. Members of other LC-MS congregations are welcome, but we ask that you please see the pastor before communing. If you arrive too late to do this before the service, please introduce yourself to the pastor after the service.

Visitors

We welcome you. Please sign the guest book and introduce yourself to the Pastor. Also complete a blue attendance card located in the pews and put an X in the () if you will be communing with us. We invite you to join us for Bible Study on Sundays at 9:30 a.m. in the school gym.

Passiontide

As the passion of Our Lord's crucifixion and resurrection draws nearer, the church observes an even deeper reflection on the pain, suffering, and sacrifice of Jesus for our life and forgiveness. While the fourth Sunday in Lent (Laetare) gave a brief reprieve from the penitential nature of Lent, the fifth Sunday in Lent (**Judica**) brings even greater anticipation of Good Friday. Judica is sometimes called "Passion Sunday," which is the beginning of Passiontide: Judica, Palmarum, and Holy Week. For that reason, on Judica, the crosses are veiled as Jesus hid himself and leaves the temple in humble expectation of the cross. The gauzy black material used to veil is black, like that of a widow's mourning veil. Historically, paintings would be veiled also, and any artistic triptychs closed. During Passiontide, the lesser Gloria Patri ("Glory Be To the Father...") is omitted when used with psalmody and canticles, just as the Alleluias and the greater Gloria in Excelsis are omitted during the Gesimatide (Pre-Lent) and Lent seasons. This means that the end of the Nunc Dimittis and Magnificat is removed until the joy of the resurrection in Easter Season. The next Sunday in Passiontide (**Palmarum**) continues with the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem: Hosanna to the Son of David! Palm Sunday is part of Passiontide leading into Holy Week, hence its name, Palmarum. Thus, the Sunday before Easter includes both the festive waving of palm branches as well as the restrained reverence of the Passion of Our Lord. Palmarum often includes both the procession with palms and also the lengthy reading of the passion of Our Lord.



THE CONGREGATION AT PRAYER FOR THE WEEK OF PALM SUNDAY/SUNDAY OF THE PASSION PALMARUM

"His Blood Be On Us and Our Children" April 13 through April 19, 2025

Palmarum simply means Sunday of the Palms. The palms become part of the proclamation of the Gospel. In the Old Testament, Jericho was the City of Palms. The city was destroyed completely by God when He brought Israel into the land of Canaan. Yet, in the midst of the destruction, there were those who were saved by faith. Rahab confessed the God of Israel to be the true God, and she and her household were spared. In faith, she marked her window with a scarlet cord, even as Christ's blood marks us His people today. Branches were also used to mark the doors of houses with the blood of the lamb for Passover. So, on this day, the branches were cast before the Lamb of God who comes to take away the sins of the world by the shedding of His blood upon the cross. In Christ, we have our new Passover. There is to be no return to our Jewish roots or odd Jewish celebrations around the Passover. We need no such reminders or experiences. Christ is our Passover, and in the Supper, we eat of the Lamb that death might pass us by.

CATECHISM FOR THE WEEK: Table of Duties To Husbands

Husbands, in the same way be considerate as you live with your wives, and treat them with respect as the weaker partner and as heirs with you of the gracious gift of life, so that nothing will hinder your prayers. *1 Peter 3:7*

Husbands, love your wives and do not be harsh with them. Colossians 3:19

Luther, Lectures on Galatians 6:14 (1535): Here Paul shows what true Christian boasting is, namely, to boast, rejoice, and be proud in suffering, shame, weakness, etc. The world not only regards Christians as the most despicable of men; but with vehemence and what it regards as righteous zeal, it hates, persecutes, condemns, and kills them as a dangerous menace to both the spiritual and the earthly realm, in other words, as heretics and revolutionaries. But because they are not suffering on account of murder, stealing, and other such crimes, but on account of Christ, whose blessings and glory they proclaim, they glory in their afflictions and in the cross of Christ.... Our boasting increases and is confirmed by two facts: (1) that we are sure that we have the pure and divine doctrine, (2) that our cross or suffering is the suffering of Christ. When the world persecutes and slays us, therefore, we do not have any reason to complain and lament, but only to rejoice and exult. The world regards us as miserable and abominable; but Christ, who is greater than the world and for whose sake we are suffering, pronounces us blessed and commands us to rejoice.... (Matt. 5:11-12)... Therefore, our boasting is far different from that of the world, which does not glory in its affliction, shame, persecution, death, etc., but in its power, wealth, peace, honor, wisdom, and righteousness. But sorrow and confusion lie at the end of such glory and rejoicing. "The cross of Christ" does not mean, of course, the wood that Christ carried on His shoulders and to which He then was nailed. No, it refers, in general, to all the afflictions of all the faithful, whose sufferings are the sufferings of Christ.... Therefore, "the cross of Christ" refers, in general, to all the afflictions which the church suffers on Christ's account, as Christ Himself testifies when He says in Acts 9:4: "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute Me?" Saul had not done any violence to Christ, but only to His church.... Christ, our Head, makes our afflictions His own so that when we, who are His

body, suffer, He is affected as though the evils were His own. It is helpful to know this so that we are not overly sad or even completely desperate when we see our enemies persecuting, excommunicating, and murdering us, or when we see the heretics hating us so bitterly.... When we consider the sufferings we receive only so far as we ourselves are involved in them, they become not only troubling but intolerable.... Now it is evident that the only reason we must endure the hate and persecution of our opponents today is that we preach Christ purely. If we were to deny Him and to accept their wicked errors and godless forms of worship, they would not only stop hating and persecuting us but would even offer us honors, riches, etc. Because we suffer all this on Christ's account, we can most certainly glory with Paul in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, that is, not in power, the goodwill of men, riches, etc., but in trouble, weakness, sorrow, fightings of body and fears of spirit (2 Corinthians 7:5), persecution, and every evil. (*LW* 27:133-135, St. Louis: Concordia, 1964)


