The Resurrection of Our Lord

Alleluia! Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! Easter is the chief festival of the Church Year. On this day (and throughout the 50 day season) the Church celebrates the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. The etymology of the word Easter is hotly debated. Skeptics assert it comes from the supposed Celtic fertility goddess Oestra, who was perhaps venerated around this time of year. But most likely the word Easter is from an old Nordic word ausa, which means "to pour water" (referring either to water pouring freely through Spring rivers OR water poured out in Baptism at the Easter Vigil!). While the word Easter is debated, the details of the holiday (i.e. Jesus' Resurrection confirmed by many proofs) are not. The date of Easter changes from year to year and is arrived at with the following formula: the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox. The liturgical color is gold or white, the color of joy, purity, and light. On Easter, all the worship elements that were omitted in Lent return: the Alleluia, the Hymn of Praise, and the Gloria Patri.



Wives, submit to your husbands as to the Lord. Ephesians 5:22

They were submissive to their own husbands, like Sarah, who obeyed Abraham and called him her master. You are her daughters if you do what is right and do not give way to fear. **1 Peter 3:5-6**

Luther, Sermon for Holy Easter (1533): Therefore, we must not only believe that Christ died and rose from the dead in his own person, but also that we partake of this suffering and resurrection as a treasured gift and derive genuine comfort from the same, even as we sing in the Easter hymn: "Christ is arisen from the grave's dark prison; We now rejoice with gladness; Christ will end all sadness." Clearly, Christ wishes to comfort us with his resurrection. That is a great hymn and very comforting, yes, with truly inspiring text, teaching us that the victory and the glorious resurrection of this most noble person is a gift to all believers, for each one to have against his own death; I against mine, you against yours, for Christ's resurrection is greater than heaven and earth. By it, the sins and death of all mankind have been swallowed up. My righteousness cannot redeem me from a single sin, let alone the entire burden of sin and death. But because this person is true God and man, he accomplishes it, gaining an eternal, glorious victory over sin, death, and the devil. The same victory is mine if only I believe in him and confess him to be the person who has accomplished all this for me and all believers. If a person does not wish to believe this, let him be. We preach to those who gladly hear and who have need of this message. These are the ones who live in mortal fear and despair of death and say, I have sinned; I have neither peace nor rest. When the devil attacks an individual, he makes heaven and earth too narrow for the person. The devil plagues me at times, too, creating such a tempest and fire over a forgivable sin that I find that I do not know what to do. Those are his tactics with sin. He does the same with death also. He can intimidate a person in such a frightful, horrible, heinous manner that the individual forgets entirely about God and His Word.

He is a virtuoso and a champion when it comes to sin and death, reproaching a person in a very masterful manner. . . . Against such an enemy it is necessary and needful that we arm and compose ourselves with a correct understanding of the power and fruit of Christ's resurrection,

... that he shares his estate and inheritance with us. He did not come for his own sake to earth; for his own sake, he did not permit himself to be crucified; he had no need of this for himself, but rather bore our sin and by his death devoured and swallowed up our death. Hell, to which we were destined, he has destroyed, as the prophet Hosea writes (13:14) ... He is speaking of our death and of hell which held us captive, stating that he will exterminate the sin which accuses me, and he will annihilate death and hell which would devour and swallow me up. (*Sermons of Martin Luther, The House Postils,* 2:14-15, Grand Rapids: Baker, 1996)

How often have you heard the pastor say "Peace be with you"? These are the words of the Risen Christ spoken to you by His called and ordained servants. They have their power and authority in the death and resurrection of Christ. It is from His death and resurrection that your peace comes. It is not death alone or resurrection alone, but the two together. The peace Christ offers is seen in the wounded hands, feet, and side. Are these not the five wounds that remind us of the Law that condemns us in the five books of the Law? He bore the curse of the Law that you might receive the gift of peace from His Father, instead of the punishment from the Father that you rightly earn. The wounds remain on His hands as a continual reminder of the price He paid for your salvation. Yet the One who holds out those wounded hands is alive. He is not a bodiless spirit or ghost. He is a living, breathing, eating man in the flesh. This is the life that He gives to you in the sacrament of baptism the very victory over death itself. Do not fear that your bodies are nothing for they have been adopted as sons of the Father and will share fully in the resurrection of Christ. The pastor gives you peace and then reads the Word of the Risen Christ to you. The pastor gives you peace as you eat and drink the Risen Lord's body and blood that prepares your body for the resurrection of all flesh. Your bodies become witnesses of this peace as you daily share in the sufferings of Christ and finally in His resurrection to eternal life. Believe these words of peace for they are not a wish, but a promise.
